1981 Achieved grade "E", lowest pass, for high school A-level in Geography in the UK, and thus denied entry to all chosen university courses in Geography. (Attended a crammer college in London and retook the exam with considerably more success E>A!)

Demotion

I was the inaugural full Professor of Political Ecology at Lancaster University, UK from 2017-19. Resigned because family moved back to Australia, and my country of birth was self-destructing under Brexit. Went back to Associate Professor at my old university.

A university research institute in my field – Feb. 2014. Restructuring of the institute went on without the board - and the Director then removed some of us from the Board. Those let go were pretty surprised.

2019. Kindly asked on a research trip to Ghana paid for by a small UK grant. Then there was a call for UK GCRF/AHRC funding applications on agrarian transformations for which we were eligible. One university led the proposal but did not inform others that they had restricted participation to their university staff only, and to partners in Africa. They won over c£300,000.

2019. Pulled out of a European Horizon 2020 application with many partners, to work in New Caledonia and Vanuatu, because I was leaving the UK and the overheads payable were not acceptable to Lancaster. It was successful and awarded €1.3m!

2018. *Social monitoring of the Koniambo project in New Caledonia*. With Matthias Kowasch and IAC. Contract never awarded after a year and a half delay. €xxx,000

Publications

Rejected

2019 co-authored article for a special issue on borders for an online journal was submitted, blind reviewed, resubmitted with changes, then rejected by the special issue and journal editors at the last moment. No chance to revise again. Published in xxx instead - accepted by an editor with small changes, based on the earlier reviews.

2016 article for *Economic Geography* – rejected by editor, without reviews. Reworked and rejected by *Environment and Planning A*, 3 reviews. Rejected by *Regional Studies*, no reviews. Rejected by *Global Sustainability*, 3 reviews. Unpublished as of 2022- I think it is one of our best.

2015 *Journal of Latin American Politics* – rejected by editor, without reviews (published elsewhere)

2015 *Conservation and Society* – rejected, resubmitted, rejected again, with two rounds of reviews. Published in a different form 3 yrs later in one of geography's top 3 journals.

2007 *Higher Education Research and Development* – rejected after reviews (published elsewhere)

One edited book proposal sent to Duke University Press – never heard back. Also sent to University of Arizona Press – no reply

Never finished

The list is long.

One book of short entries on key topics – contract received, but never completed by us.

One edited book, massively late.

About 20 papers on the computer with over a few paragraphs written, some dating back over a decade, that seemed important at the time.
